He snatched it up and while most of the players thought they had both runner and ball buried beneath the struggling mass of humanity, Fleming was touchdown bound, 35 yards. George's kick was good and the first quarter ended with Valdosta 27 to 0 over Adel.

Coach Frank Reiff's Hornets night in Cleveland tomorrow Field, the defending State Champs have hustled through "one of the toughest weeks of practice this year," according to Coach Wright Bazemore.

And the thing which brings sparkles to the coaches' eyes is the fact that the blocking, which had been singled out as a chief weakness in last Friday's 28-0 victory over Baxley, has never

"Our blocking has been as sharp as I've seen it this season," said the Valdosta mentor, "especially in our workouts on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons."

The spirit this week in the Wildcat camp has been at its highest point and it has been a general observation that if the VHS gridders can carry their practice pace into the upcoming games, they'll be odds-on favorites to live up to their pre-season rave notices.

So far along in the season, the Valdosta defense has been the target for praise. Manned by as rugged a bunch of gridiron stalwarts as can be found in the Class A circle, the sturdy Wildcat forward echelon and its scrappy fleet of backfield "pluggers," promise to give Valdosta High an even better, more formidable defense than last year.

But this week the Wildcat offensive machine has taken over the show. With the way paved by aggressive "hole making" in the line and devastating downfield blocking, Wildcat runners have been clicking consistently through the defenders for long gains.

It is the downfield blocking which has been particularly sparkling. And one reason noted for its brilliance has been the impromptu contest between the offensive players.

When a play is run to the left, the right side tears down field. And when the play is to the right, the left side tries to get down faster than the right side did.

It is a unique system and typical of championship play; one that will award its prizes when the chips are down in actual combat.

Already the system has brought praise to the Wildcats' performance. In the line, big Paul Mc-Neal and James Warren at the tackles and Floyd Rogers at guard, are probably the most improved blockers over last year.

And when these boys head downfield, they block anything in sight. It's dangerous for spectators to wander too close to the sidelines.

End play has been sharp, with Jimmy Walker and Ronnie Wetherington, two of the best flankers to come along in some time, developing rapidly into demons as blockers.

Rounding out the front wall are guard Ray Moore, a consistently tough path-maker and all-state candidate Herman Parramore, whose accurate snaps from center have been a main factor in the smoothness of the Wildcat offensive.

The backfield has made rapid advances toward precisioned performance now that Noel George and Bobby Renfroe have learned they can block equally as well as they lug the leather. And the "arrival" of Red Fleming gives the Cats, as his showing this week would indicate, a fullback who can stack up with any on the Valdosta schedule.

Sammy Hardin, polished and learned field general, becomes more shifty in the ball handling department as the days go by. Hardin, co-captains the Wildcat squad with Herman Parramore.
