Valdosta Attack Has Been Rolling

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But Baze was aware then what three of Valdosta's 1971 opponents have since found out, the Wildcats can indeed move the football.

This past Friday they chalked up more than 450 yards in total offense as they rolled past the Crisp County Cougars from Cordele, 49-7. In two earlier games they blanked Thomasville, 49-0, and gunned down Dougherty of Albany, 47-7.

In three outings they've totaled 145 points, which is more than many teams tally in a full 10-game season.

During this torrent of points the fans have been well aware of the backs and pass receivers who have been doing the scoring.

But here's a tip. Next time the Wildcats play watch the blocking in VHS' offensive line. Against Crisp it was certainly a deciding factor and Bazemore said so with emphasis.

Line Play Sharp

The leaders up front include end George Rountree, tackles Paul Demersseman and Wade Johnson, guards Sidney Earnest, David Register, Robert Joseph and Calvin Lester and centers Steve Stanaland and Paul Lore.

Their job is to provide protection for the passer when the 'Cats want to throw and open holes when a running play is called. They have been carrying out both assignments in excellent fashion. When a team's attack moves, then you know the linemen are doing their job.

"We've been able to make both our passing and running game work so far," Bazemore allows. "I thought our backs, receivers and linemen, especially our linemen, did good jobs against Crisp. That certainly doesn't mean they can afford to let up and start coasting. We still have plenty of room for improvement.

"As for defense, that's where we have the least experience and it showed in the first half against Crisp. But there were also some bright spots on defense. Again, we still have plenty of room for improvement."

Right Reaction

One thing Bazemore did find out about the 'Cats last Friday was how they would react to being stung. VHS scored first, then Crisp came right back with a sustained drive of 77 yards for a TD to tie it at 7-7.

The Wildcats' reaction was a scoring march of 93 yards to quickly regain the lead. It was exactly the kind of reaction Bazemore wanted.

Valdosta has now posted three onside wins and believe it or not that brings on a problem. The Wildcats, on an individual basis, must battle against overconfidence.

"Our players must remember that the season is still very young and that we have a lot of tough games to play," Bazemore said. "If we become overconfident, especially this early in the year, we're in for trouble, real trouble."

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Prep Grid Races Still Uncertain

We're now three weeks into the 1971 high school football season, but about all we've learned about the region races in this neck of the woods is that anything may happen between now and title time.

At present coach Wright Bazemore's Valdosta Wildcats are atop the Region 1-AAA standings. The 'Cats are going for their fourth straight crown in this league.

(Waycross) has one of its best teams in several seasons. Cook (Adel) has one win in three tries, but is much better than its record might seem to indicate.

Region 2-B is a muddled affair with Brantley County (Nahunta) showing early strength and, for the moment, perhaps the favorite in this league.

As we've already noted, the prep title races in this area are still wide open affairs.

Fast Pace

It remains to be seen if the University of Georgia's sophomore quarterback Andy Johnson can keep up his early pace, but if he does he's going to break some team records.

While leading the Bulldogs past Oregon State and Tulane, Johnson rushed for a total of 239 yards, an average of 119.5 per tilt.

He looks like a sure bet to break Georgia's record for yards gained rushing by a quarterback. The current mark of 507 was set in 1967 by Kirby Moore.

And the way Johnson is going right now he could topple the Bulldogs' all-time season rushing record of 1,103 yards set by Frank Sinkwich in 1941 when he averaged 110.3 per outing.

Johnson might also be headed for Southeastern Conference sophomore-of-the-year honors. Another Bulldog, tailback Ricky Lake, got the nod in that department in 1970.

Bounds Honored

Valdosta High's senior quarterback Stanley Bounds has been rated one of the top-25 prep players in the country by Lettermen magazine.

The magazine, in its September issue, says the list of 25 was selected from nearly 1,000,000 players representing 16,000 high schools.

Those who saw Bounds set new Region 1-AAA passing and total offense records in 1970 and have been on hand to see his three performances so far this year have to agree that the magazine made a wise choice.

Incidentally, Bounds was the only Georgian to land in the top-25.

Two others from our state, however, were in the second or "Special Mention" group. They are Kendrick (Columbus) running back Donald Byrd and Gordan (Decatur) quarterback Ronnie Pearce.

But 'Dosta still faces the toughest part of its schedule and must play what figure to be several key games on the road. One very serious challenger is Moultrie. The Packers currently own a 2-0 chart.

In the western half of Region 1-AA balance is evident. Early County (Blakely), Cairo and Brooks County (Quitman) have all made it this far without a loss, although none has faced a sub-division foe. And still to be considered is always-tough Americus.

Over in Region 1-AA (East) there's been little league action, but Camden County (Woodbine) has clicked off a pair of impressive wins.

Top AAA Teams Are Stable

The top five places in this week's Atlanta Journal Class AAA **Top Ten** football poll remained basically the same as last week's, but the bottom five places underwent considerable change.

Valdosta polled all nine first place votes for a maximum possible total of 180 points. Ballots are scored on the basis of 20 points for first place, 18 for second, 16 for third, etc.

Macon-Central, tied with Lakeside for second place last week, defeated Peach County 33-0 to move two points ahead of defending AAA football champion Lakeside in the battle for second place, 150-148.

KENDRICK remained No. 5 and Warner Robins No. 6. Both have 3-0 records.

The last five places were scrambled somewhat. Benedictine moved up from seventh to sixth, replacing Dalton, which dropped to seventh. Moultrie, a 21-14 winner over Tift County, moved up from 10th to eighth, dropping Richmond Academy into the No. 9 slot. Henderson, 2-0, ousted Waycross, 2-1, and claimed the No. 10 spot.

West Rome and Dykes remained 1-2 in Class AA, but Gainesville, a 14-7 loser to Clarke Central over the weekend, dropped from third all the way out of the Top Ten, the most radical change in any of the five polls.

STATESBORO moved up from fourth to third, North Fulton from fifth to fourth, Lakeshore from sixth to fifth, and Westminster and St. Pius X, ranked 7-9 last week, this week tied for sixth place with 60 points each. Southwest DeKalb moved up a notch to eighth, and Cairo, a 14-7 winner over favored Fitzgerald, moved into a tie with Monroe Area for 10th place.

In Class A, Carrollton, Jefferson and Metter remain 1-2-3 in the opinion of the nine judges, but McEachern, ranked fourth last week, lost a 23-0 battle to North Cobb and dropped from fourth to eighth.

Turner County replaced McEachern at No. 4, Rockmart, tied for seventh with Roswell last week, defeated Cartersville, 23-10, and jumped up to fifth. Lincolnton, sixth last week, lost to Aquinas, 13-6, and dropped out of the Top Ten, and Irwin County, ninth last week, defeated Miller County, 13-8, and ad-

Two of Georgia's most talented high school passers will be on opposite sides when Valdosta's Wildcats and Crisp County's Cougars from Cordele clash here Friday night in a crucial Region 1-AAA football contest.

Coach Wright Bazemore's 'Cats and coach Tom Avert's Cougars will carry matching 2-0 records into the game, which is set for 8 p. m. at Cleveland Field. Right now they share the region lead. Two other loop members, Moultrie and Albany, have 1-0 charts.

Doing the tossing for the 'Cats will be 175-pound senior quarterback Stanley Bounds, who has hit on 17 of 37 passes for 359 yards.

Leading the Cougars' potent aerial assault will be Danny Blizzard, a 190-pound senior, who has connected on 19 of 37 tosses for 316 yards.

Valdosta's victories have come over Thomasville, 49-0, and Dougherty (Albany), 47-7. Crisp has licked Tift County (Tifton), 21-6, and Bainbridge, 14-3. That game with Bainbridge wasn't nearly as close

A city wide football pep rally is scheduled for 8 o'clock here tonight in the parking lot of the Brookwood Plaza Shopping Center.

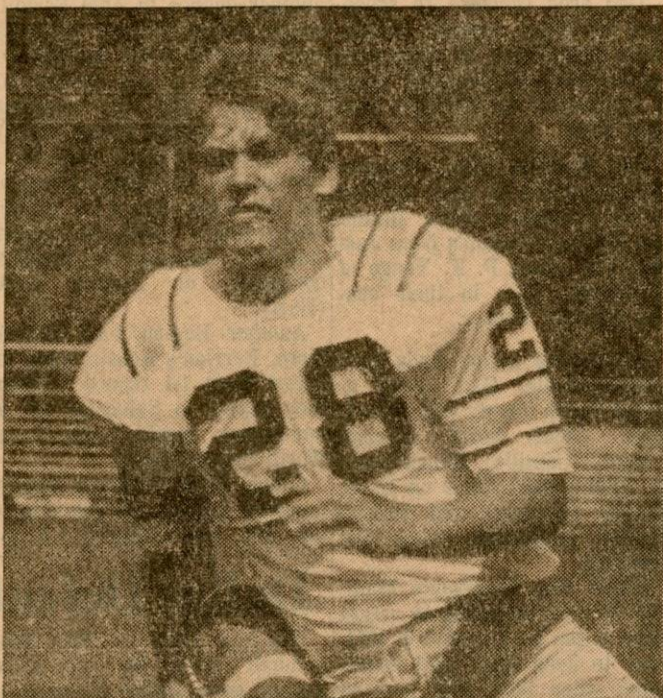

Just two of Blizzard's aerial

targets are Bill Dixon and Mike Phillips, a pair of 195-pound seniors who stand 6-3. Dixon, who is the current 1-AAA dash champ, and Phillips can both run the 100 in well under nine seconds. The Cougars have a hard-hitting running attack led by Carzie Mercer, a 185-pound junior, Dixon is also extremely dangerous as a kick returner.

It all adds up to a lot of problems for Valdosta's relatively green defensive unit. The lone returning regular on the 'Cats' stop'em unit is deep back Gary Rowe, a 185-pound junior. Against Dougherty last week he was credited with eight tackles.

What with scoring 96 points in two games, the Wildcats have had success with their passing and ground attack up

to now. But Bazemore rates Crisp's defense as being much stronger than the ones Thomasville and Dougherty had to offer.

"That's going to be a whole new deal out there for us on both offense and defense Friday night," Bazemore said. "If we make a mistake either way, Crisp is going to nail us. And let me tell you they're going to come here sky high. We've got to be ready, and I mean really ready."

High school football rankings were stable at the top this week, except in Class B play, where Southeast Bulloch's 21-6 upset of Wreans dropped Wreans from a first place tie to seventh.

Cairo advanced from 9th place to 5th by upsetting 5th-ranked Fitzgerald 14-7. Fitzgerald dropped to an 8th place tie with Early County.

Powerful Carrollton still reigns in Class A football, although its game with West Rome last week was postponed. The Trojans attracted six first place ballots and led the nearest contender—Turner County—by 18 points.

'Cats Still Top Prep Rate Chart

Upsets rattled the high school football rankings this week, and so did several decisive victories by low-ranking teams.

Biggest to fall was Roswell, defending Class A champion and possessor of the No. 1 ranking before its opening game at Wills last week. Wills, which had not tasted victory in two years, stumped Roswell 7-6, knocking the North Georgia team down to a fifth-place tie with Lithonia.

Roswell did, however, earn one first-place vote. The rest went to Carrollton, which rose to No. 1 ranking by defeating Troup County 30-12.

In Class AAA ball, where Valdosta and Lakeside reaffirmed their No. 1 and No. 2 rankings with victories, Richmond Academy of Augusta took a tumble, losing 9-7 to North Augusta, S.C., and falling from

third to seventh place in the rankings.

Powerful Central of Macon took over the No. 3 slot after crushing Baldwin 42-6. Kendrick of Columbus jumped two notches to fourth by thumping Carver of Columbus 36-0.

In Class AA play, big West Rome rose to No. 1 ranking by shutting out Class A contender Coosa 18-0. Dykes of Atlanta dropped to second, even though the Colts stopped East Atlanta 38-0.

First place votes were scattered, with West Rome and Dykes polling two each and Fitzgerald, ranked fifth, polling one.

In Class B football, Lovett and Wrens tied for the No. 1 ranking, even though Wrens polled only one first place vote and had to depend on its second-place votes.

The rankings are calculated each week from the votes of a seven-man panel of sports writers and broadcasters picked by The Associated Press. Each first place vote counts 10 points, a second-place vote nine, and so on.

The first time the Wildcats got their hands on the football they zipped 43 yards in six plays for a touchdown. They were never in danger of losing the advantage after that.

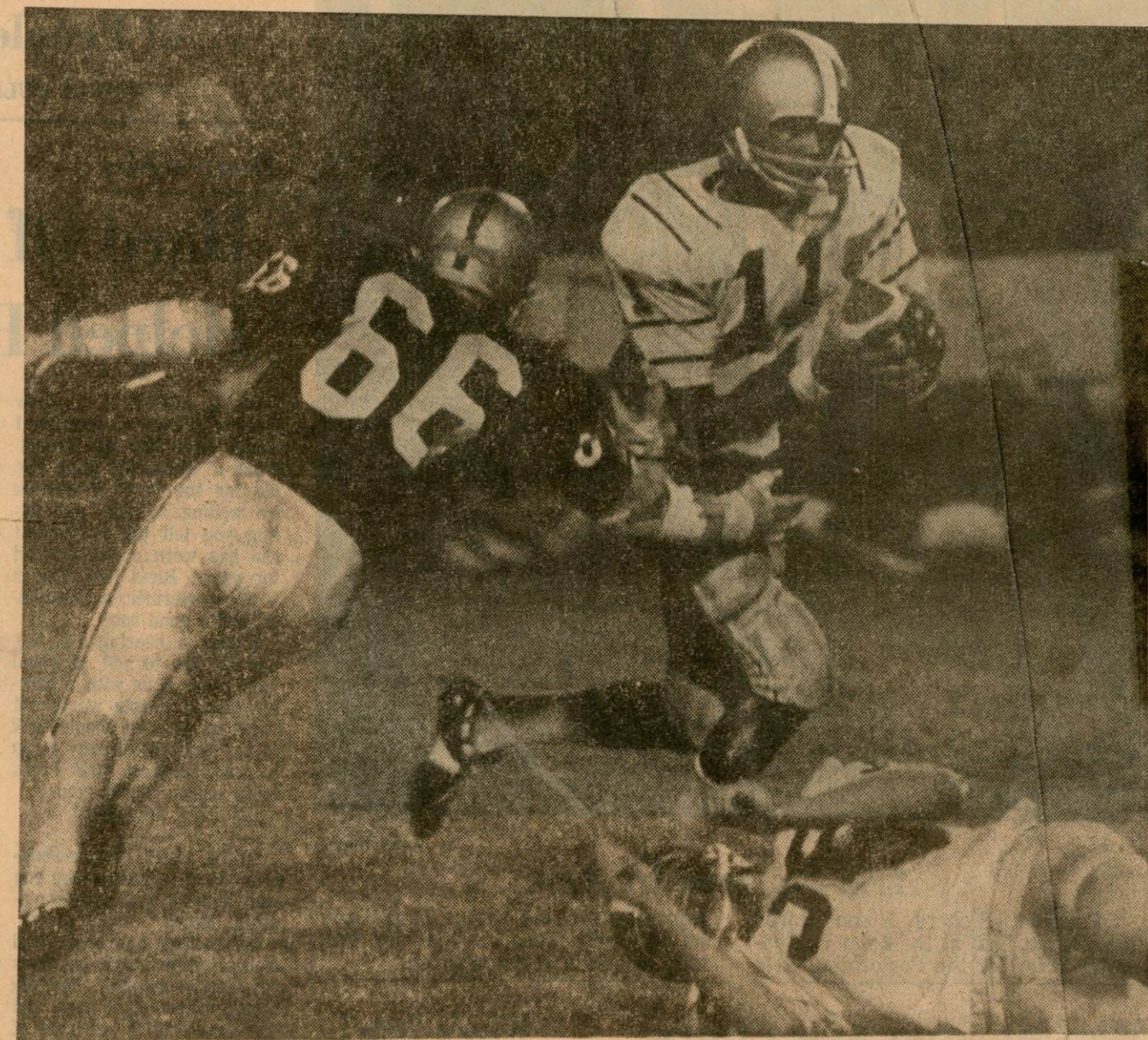
VHS began sending in its reserves early in the game and well before the contest was over the 'Cats' bench had been cleared.
