9,000 is expected.



Another eyebrow-raiser in the South Georgia area is the 6-0 record Brantley has posted in 2-B. The Herons, who are only in their third year of football although annually rated as a basketball power, have used scoring versatility plus a solid defense for their gaudy mark.

The setback left coach J. B. Roland's Bearcats with an 0-2-1




It was the third weekend, in some cases the fourth, for prep football teams in Georgia, and the offenses were roll-

Bazemore TV Special Is Set for Tuesday

VALDOSTA, Ga. — Valdosta's ultra successful high school football coach, Wright Bazemore, will be the subject of a television special next Tuesday night.

Bazemore will be featured in a special 30-minute program beginning at 10:30 a.m. on Channel 6 which has studios in Tallahassee and Thomasville.

Don Meiklejohn, executive director for news and public affairs of Channel 6, said, "Basically we are trying to tell the story of Bazemore and take him and show him as a person."

The program entitled, "Mr.

Bazemore," will include film of Valdosta ballgames, crowds, bands and locker room activities. There will be interviews with Bazemore, locker room interviews and quotes from people who have worked with the veteran coach.

Meiklejohn said Bazemore was asked whether or not he plans to retire in the interview but the television executive declined to reveal the answer pending the showing of the program.

Bazemore came to Valdosta in the early 1940s and after one year assumed the duties of head coach. With the exception of time out for military service he has coached at Valdosta High ever since, compiling an outstanding record in Georgia high school/ circles and winning state championships in every classification in which he played as the school grew larger.

Finally reaching AAA classification in the late 1950s, Bazemore teams virtually dominated the state's largest classification through the entire decade of the 60s. He followed this up with an undefeated regular season team in 1970 which lost in the second round of the playoff. His current edition of the Valdosta Wildcats is undefeated and is ranked No. 1 in the state.
