

VHS Bomb Scare Brings School Policy Questions

Sir:

It seems that there is a disturbing and possibly hazardous situation at Valdosta High School.

As already reported, a bomb scare occurred at the school on Thursday, Nov. 4. The gravity of the situation impels us to write this letter.

As you most probably realize, bombings and bomb scares have become a part, although not accepted, of our society. The frequency of such action requires that we be prepared for any emergency. The school, being a public building, is a possible target for this form of dissent. Thus, we must be forever alert.

In the Valdosta Daily Times, Lloyd Mims, principal of VHS, was quoted as saying that an anonymous caller had warned him of a bomb. He was also quoted as saying that there was a definite and prescribed policy for this type of occurence and that the teachers were informed of this policy.

Mr. Mims was quoted as saying that this policy required the removal of the students from campus. Acording to the paper, he said that this had been done. Drawing upon this and our experiences and interrogations we now set forth the

questions below:

If school policy dictated the removal of the students from campus, why was this not done? If the teachers were aware of this policy, why was this not carried out? If this was in fact a bomb scare and if in fact an anonymous call was received, why was the fire department at the school approximately ten minutes?

Why were the students allowded into the building after this short length of time? If the caller said that the bombwould explode in five minutes, why would you trust one who breaks the law?

Why was there no proper investigation? Why were the students not aware of procedure for a bomb threat? Finally, if a bomb had exploded, what would the result have been?

We feel that the welfare of the teachers and students rests on the answers to these questions. It is our sincere belief that these questions warrant valid and prompt answers.

This letter is not meant to smear anybody but to insure the safety of the inhabitants of the school building. In the event on an explosion we do not want anyone hurt. We are sure the administration can concur with our sentiments.

With a 40-0 victory over cross-town rival Lowndes this past Friday night Valdosta's football Wildcats closed out reg-

ular season play with a perfect 10-0 record.

As the 1-AAA champs VHS is again in the state Class AAA playoffs. The 'Cats, however, must wait un-til Friday to find out who they will be meeting in the first round of state title competition.

That's when b Baker's Lions of Columbus and Warner Robins' Demons will meet in a playoff for the Re-That 2-AAA crown. league is sub-divided, with Baker (9-1) the western vic-tor and Warner Robins (8-0-2) the eastern titleholder.

Under a rotation system Valdosta will go against the 2-AAA survivor here next week, on Friday, Nov. 26, to be exact. Under that same ro-

tation system the Wildcats will continue to play in their home stadium as long as they stay in the playoffs, hopefully all the way to the state finals, which would mean a total of three more games for the 'Cats.

Still in the state title running down here in the southern half of the state are 4-AAA victor Laney of Augusta (9-1) and 3-AAA sub-division champs Wayne County (Jesup), which has a 9-1 mark, and Groves, with an 8-1-1 chart.

Wayne and Groves must playoff this week, with the victor dualing Laney part week. Mannable there's a battle to be

dueling Laney next week. Meanwhile, there's a battle to be fought in the northern half of the state between four Class

fought in the northern half of the state between four Class AAA region winners up that way.

There are, at this stage, still quite a few teams left in the running for the 1971 "AAA" state championship. They number six in the south, Valdosta, Baker, Warner Robins, Laney, Groves and Wayne and the best I can figure, seven in the north — Douglas County, Forest Park, Griffin, Avondale, Columbia, Henderson and Lakeshore.

Right now all the Wildcats' fans can do is wait and wonder whether it will be Baker or Warner Robins which will come here next week to give Valdosta its first playoff test.

Other Races

Now let's take a look at how things went in some region

races in other classifications in this neck of the woods.

Charlton County emerged as the Region 2-B champion. It finished with a 6-2 overall record while Brantley County closed

with a final 8-2 mark.

But in league competition Charlton went 5-0 to 4-1 for Brantley. A 7-0 win by Charlton over Brantley was the deciding contest.

Fitzgerald's Hurricanes have the Region 1-AA (East) championship nailed down. Fitz was 9-1 for the season and 6-0 in sub-division play. The Hurricanes settled the issue with a 23-0 win over Ware County this past Friday night. The Gators finished 8-2 and 5-1.

Vote Needed

As for the Region 1-AA (West) race, it had an unusual windup. Cairo and Early County (Baxley) both had 8-1-1 over-

all and 3-0-1 sub-division records.

That league tie for both of them came when they fought each other to 13-13 deadlock. Under this situation, in a sub-division race, the Georgia High School Association rules say

Valdosta High's football Wildcats still nave a regular season game to play with Lowndes' Vikings and you can be sure the 'Cats aren't taking their cross-town rival for granted.

But when Valdosta rolled past the Tift County Blue Devils, 60-28, this past Friday night at Tifton the 'Cats boosted their record to 9-0 and nailed down the Region 1-AAA championship and earned a berth in the state Class AAA playoffs.

This is the fourth

straight year coach Wright Bazemore's charges have captured the 1-AAA diadem, and this is a first for them since they moved into the league in 1958.






