Playoffs Hit Semifinal Stage

After this Friday night, only one undefeated team will remain in the Class AA state prep foot-

ball playoffs.

North Fulton, a 47-0 winner over Turner in a quarterfinal match at Lakewood Stadium last Friday, entertains West Rome, a 14-7 winner over Gainesville last Friday.

North Fulton has an 11-0

record, and in the most recent Journal Top Ten Poll was ranked No. 2, while West Rome is 12-0 and ranked No. 1 in AA.

The game either will be played at Lakewood Stadium or Grady Stadium in Atlanta. Officials of both schools were to meet at 1 p.m. Sunday to decide which.

It was expected West Rome might have some reservations about playing at Lakewood, since that stadium is equipped with AstroTurf.

"I hope we can persuade them to play at Lakewood," said North Fulton coach Dickie

Bean. "I think the artificial surface speeds up a game. Of course, West Rome would have every opportunity to practice on it to become accustomed to the feel."

In the other AA semifinal game, surprising Westminster goes to Fitzgerald. Westminster emerged from a rough regular season schedule, coming out of perhaps the most balanced of any region of any classification in the state, with a hard-earned 6-3-1 record.

There was one midseason stretch, during which the Wildcats were minus several key players because of injuries, when Westminster lost three of four games. But a peculiar chain of events allowed Westminster to win the South half of Region 4-AA, the Wildcats beat Marist (for a second time) 16-7 in the region championship game, then upset previously unbeaten Lakeshore, 7-6, last Friday in a quarterfinal playoff match.

There were other shockers last Friday. Laney (10-1) defeated a powerful Groves team, 20-6, in one AAA quarterfinal; Roswell (which had a 6-4 regular season record) defeated Jefferson, 23-7, in a Class A quarterfinal; and St. Joseph (also 6-4

during the regular season) demolished Oconee County, 39-0 in a Class B quarterfinal.

In other AAA playoff games, No. 1 ranked Valdosta won an astoundingly easy victory over No. 2 ranked Warner Robins, 35-6, Forest Park upended South Cobb, 38-7, and Avondale used a late 38-yard field goal to nip Henderson, 10-8.

In the other Class A playoff game, Vidalia whipped Putnam County, 26-13. This week, Vidalia meets Turner County (11-0) in one semifinal, while Roswell faces No. 1 ranked Carrollton (10-

Valdosta Romps By Warner Robins

VALDOSTA, Ga. - Okay, the rumors are out again.

They say Wright Bazemore, Georgia's most famous and winningest high school football coach, is about to retire.

He probably is.

That is, if Valdosta again wins the Class AAA state high school football championship.

Friday night, Valdosta moved a step closer to reaching that goal again.

The powerful and unbeaten Wildcats trounced Warner Robins, 35-6, Friday night in the opening round of the AAA state playoffs.

A coach had quipped last week that Warner Robins had played itself into a position of having to face the "University of Valdosta" and he wasn't far from wrong.

Quarterback Stanley Bounds struck for 193 yards and two touchdowns via the pass and ran for three other scores as Valdosta left little doubt as to its AAA aims.

Stanford Rome, Valdosta's

6-4 sophomore end, grabbed eight of Bounds' passes for 117 yards and a touchdown.

Jerome Durham was most of the show for Warner Robins, gaining 93 yards in 16 tries, but Warner Robins did not manage a touchdown until late in the game.



"There was no problem and only one incident occurred about that even though the people who bought the stubs were told it was for standing room o-

"The game had started and the Jaycees saw some room for people to stand after several people asked if they could come in to see the game. It was a spur of the moment decision but it won't happen again," said Goo-

He said local school officials had gone to a lot of trouble to prevent any one standing to see the game and keep traffic to a

minimum.

Goolsby said the board met in special session Sunday night to talk about the ticket stub situation with the Jaycees.

The Jaycees handle the ticket sales for the school board.

"We met with the Jaycees over what we have accepted as I have a misunderstanding on their

There won't be any standing room only tickets sold Friday involved one or two Jaycees who were not in the central meetings to talk about ticket sales said the superintendent.

Goolsby said that the Jaycees explained that they felt sorry for the people who did not purchase a ticket in time for the

game.

"They hated to turn people away who had driven such a long distance to see the ball game," he said.

Earlier this year the board agreed that the number of tickets printed and sold would not exceed the number of seats in the

stadium. Board finance director said the Jaycees also owe the board's Athletic Association count about \$600.



This marks the fourth time vondale has gone for state AAA" championship honors. Their first appearance in the finals was in 1960 and the Imps dropped a 20-14 decision to Valdosta that time. A Fitzgerald native, Baze was a standout athlete for the Purple Hurricanes in high school, winning a total of 16 sports letters. He scored 250 points in one season, including two games when he tallied 10 touchdowns in each against Montezuma and Waycross.

After high school he attended Mercer University and Georgia Peabody College, earning AB and MA degrees. His first coaching assignment was as an assistant in Waycross, where the Bulldogs went 9-1 in 1938 and 9-2 in '39.

A Surprise and a Habit Go for Georgia Titles

There could be two Wildcats in Georgia's championship football family after Saturday night, one a surprise, the other a habit.

The habit is Valdosta, which will seek its 14th state championship when Avondale visits Cleveland Field for a Saturday night showdown in AAA competition.

The surprise is Class AA Westminster of Atlanta. This gang of Wildcats stood 3-3-1 after midseason in perhaps the toughest AA region in the state, and had 17 injured players on the sidelines.

They overcame the injuries, however, and won the last three to capture a subregional title.

The Westminster Wildcats are not riding a six-game win streak, having dumped Marist, Marist, 16-7, for the region championship, edged unbeaten Lakeshore in quarterfinal action and whipped Fitzgerald, 14.8, in the semifinals last week.

NEIGHBORING Fulton County will be Westminster's foe tonight in Atlanta and Fulton brings an undefeated, untied mark of 13-0 into the title affair.

After two postponements, top ranked Carrollton finally met and conquered the Class A defending state champion — Rosewell — 14-0 Monday night.

Running back Jackie Crowder scored on touchdown runs of 61 and 34 yards in the second half to lead the Trojans to victory.



Just Four Left




