# Recording the Record of our Regents ...

The University System of Georgia Board of Regents [BOR] held one of its two-per-year campus location meetings at Valdosta State University October 13,14 and 15. This local BOR meeting allowed us to learn and confirm information that ties to our local history.

To our current knowledge, in the *photo at right*, are VSU's first and second graduates to be appointed to positions on the BOR, Julie Ewing Hunt of Tifton in 2003, and C. Thomas Hopkins, MD, of Griffin in 2010.

Having begun as a women's college it is interesting to note the first VSU graduate regent was Julie Ewing Hunt, VSC 1963, B.S. in Education. Julie Hunt was first appointed to the BOR in 2003 to serve out the term of her husband John Hunt, Ashburn native, Tifton resident, regional business leader and developer. She was then appointed to a full term beginning in 2004. She early taught English at Tift County High School and has now spent many years in operation of the family business, JH Services, Inc., as well as president of the Tift County Chamber of Commerce, state board member of the Georgia Economic Development Authority, and more.

Thomas (Tommy) Hopkins, MD, Orthopedic Surgeon, came to VSC from Griffin, graduated in 1975, and returned




to Griffin after completing his medical degree at Emory University. He has many fraternity brother friends in Valdosta, the writer included. So, for a superlative, we tell with a smile, that he is the first 'male' graduate of VSC to be on the Board of Regents.

An act of the Georgia Legislature in 1906 approved in Valdosta for the establishment of an agricultural, industrial, and normal college in South Georgia, as a branch of the University of Georgia. It was to be coed, but since only one dormitory could be built, and the urgent need for teachers, the Trustees voted to be female only and opened in 1913 as South Georgia State Normal College. In 1922 the school became Georgia State Womans College, then coed VSC in 1950 and VSU in 1993 . The University System of Georgia with BOR was established in 1931.

Local members of the BOR have included, *right panel upper*, Valdosta native John W. Langdale, who also served as Chancellor of the BOR, and another Valdosta native Rusty Griffin, *panel middle*, a current BOR member appointed 2011. Also, Dr. S. Walter Martin, *panel lower*, Tifton native, Emory president, BOR Vice-Chancellor, then VSC President and long time Valdosta resident after retirement.

#### Introducing Others to a Bit of our Past and Present



... The formation of three giant buffer counties in 1818 brought the first census of inland South Georgia in 1820. Georgia wanted to populate the area above then Spanish Florida. The 1820 population enumerated in the current boundaries of Lowndes County was "zero."



... The first Railroad arrived from Savannah in 1860 providing for the beginning of real development in South Georgia. New towns and county seats formed on the Johnston's line; Station (Ludowici), Jesup, Blackshear, Waycross, Homerville, Valdosta and Quitman and after the Civil War, Cairo and Donalsonville. Thomasville and Bainbridge were established towns and the railroad went to them. Note: The map at left is 1870 after railroad expansion after the Civil War.

... The new rail line stretching into remote South Georgia made Valdosta an active refugee town during the Civil War. Many returned home after the war but many stayed and some became leading citizens. Major Henry Holliday, from Griffin, stayed and became mayor of Valdosta. His son John left Valdosta for dental school and later became the Wild West figure Doc Holliday of the "Gunfight at the OK Corral" in Tombstone, AZ.




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... During the mid 1880s Valdosta leaders purposed to make something of the town. In 1889 they achieved getting the Georgia Southern & Florida rail line from Macon into Florida. Being at the edge of both the cotton belt and the range Valdosta became a center of commerce for both. Other rail lines followed and an electric street railway system. The four counties north, now on I-75; Cook, Tift, Turner and Crisp, formed in their present locations because Valdosta leaders got the railroad.

... In 1913 articles told of "Valdosta the Richest City Per Capita, Not only in Georgia, But in the United States." Patterson Street was called Millionaires row and the town's baseball club the Valdosta Millionaires. This era of local leaders funded the opening of South Georgia State Normal College (VSU).

... The Valdosta-Lowndes County Chamber of Commerce sets a high bar as an example of achievement for the rest of the community. They are among 85 chambers nationwide to achieve Five Star Accreditation from US Chamber of Commerce. Just over 1% of the 7 thousand chambers have this designation. Georgia is on the US Chamber map with eight Five Star Chambers: Valdosta, Greater Columbus, Cobb. Greater Dalton. Habersham County. Lagrange Troup County, Newnan-Coweta, and [Warner] Robins Regional. Note: The local Chamber of Commerce is headquartered in the Barber House. The Chamber celebrated 100 years in 1912 and will celebrate The Barber House 100 Years in 2015.



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... VSU has contributed significantly to the arts in South Georgia. Summer 2014 was the 25th season for Peach State Summer Theater, "PSST!," which is designated The Official Musical Theater of the State of Georgia. It is a professional extension of the VSU Theater program. Continuing in VSU Arts, 2014-2015 is the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration for the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra. The VSO serves the regional academic mission of Valdosta State and the widely supported orchestra has become an important part of the cultural life of the entire region. ... Valdosta is home to Wild Adventures Theme Park which continues as a major attraction in this region with a 12% attendance increase this season. They promote their venue as "the ultimate, affordable, theme park experience ... and great family entertainment". VSU students opted several years ago to drop an annual homecoming concert and replace it with Wild Adventures Wednesday, a night at the park.

... Valdosta and VSU are fortunate recipients of extensive area television coverage. This is due to Valdosta/ Lowndes County being the largest market in the coverage area of WALB TV (NBC) Albany and the largest market outside Tallahassee, FL for WCTV (CBS) and WTXL (ABC). In the southern third of Georgia, that between Alabama and the Atlantic Ocean, in the 2010 census, Valdosta/Lowndes is second in population with 109, 000, then Albany/ Dougherty at 94,000 and Brunswick/Glynn 79,000. Savannah/Chatham, in both the southern and middle thirds of Georgia, is largest at 265,000. None approach the population of Metro Atlanta counties.







....Moody AFB has long been a chief factor in the regional economy. It has also brought the area a variety of new residents; some only a few months for training, some retiring. Of note is that former US President George W. Bush lived here while in pilot training at Moody. He returns here this December as keynote speaker for The Georgia Christian School's 100th Year Celebration. Note: The photo, US Congressman George H. W. 
### VALDOSTA REGIONAL AIRPORT

... Speaking of flight, Valdosta Regional Airport is one of nine commercial airports in Georgia. It provides a vital link for growth. VSU International students, including 150 from South Korea, like it very much.

## WINNERSVILLE, U.S.A. Valdosta,Ga. HOME of CHAMPIONS

...A Georgia high school, Valdosta High, is currently the nation's winningest high school football program. (A Kentucky high school is in hot pursuit) Emanating from this achievement and in combination with the successes of other community teams, Valdosta was bestowed the moniker "Winnersville" in the 1980s and TitleTown, USA, in an ESPN sports network nationwide poll in 2008. Since 2004 VSU has appeared in eleven national championship final matches winning six: football 2004, 2007 and 2010; Men's tennis 2006 and 2011; and softball 2012. 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... Grand Bay WMA is located in northeast Lowndes County adjacent to Moody Air Force Base. It and the Grand Bay Wetlands Education Center are within a 13,000 acre wetland system. As a natural blackwater wetland it is second in size in Georgia only to the Okefenokee Swamp. On display is a sizeable cypress timber, left, probably accidentally, when cut about 1910. Its rings reveal it began growing circa 1290 A.D. Ocean Pond in south Lowndes is the State of Georgia's Largest "Still" Natural Body of Water, it numbered within the only significant system of natural lakes in Georgia.

...The 37<sup>th</sup> annual Sunbelt Ag Expo in Moultrie at Spence Field, 35 miles up Hwy 133, is occurring simultaneous to the Board of Regents meeting. The Expo is "North America's Premier Farm Show" and is the largest farm show exposition in the USA with 90,000 visitors expected this year. Valdosta is a chief lodging center for this event, and because of facilities Valdosta gets to participate with the Expo's prestigious "Sunbelt Expo Farmer of the Year Award" banquet held here annually at the Rainwater Convention Center. Note: *At right*, The Farmer of the Year Award 25th Anniversary template. As the Expo grew so did its scope with the Swisher Sweets Southeastern Farmer of the Year Award as an example.



...Nearby is the Georgia Grown Trail: Highway 37, our state's first such designated road. It runs through nine counties from Homerville over to I-75 and west to the Alabama border. AgriTourism is proving successful. Plans for the Highway 41 Georgia Grown Trail from Barnesville south to Valdosta and the Florida border are nearing completion. Note: Below is an image of the recently developed signage: Georgia Grown Trail 41 and photo of a recently installed sign at Raisin' Cain south of Valdosta.

#### Timeline for: Hill Avenue, U.S. Highway 84, Georgia Route 38

With the completion of the railway overpass on West Hill Avenue we at the museum were asked to supply some historic notes on the road and rail. The dates below cover some development highlights.

**1860-** Valdosta established on the RR line from Savannah, decades later U.S. 84 would parallel this route

1887- City Council officially names streets, the name Hill Avenue was already in use

**1889-** Georgia Southern and Florida RR from Macon arrives intersecting Hill Avenue and the 1860 railroad from Savannah. This intersecting was key to Valdosta's future.

1900- Original Valdosta Streetcar Rail system included West Hill Avenue

1903 - Hill Avenue first paved street in Valdosta, using brick pavers

**1912-** The East Hill Avenue line was added to the Streetcar Rail System, to Forrest Street and north

1920- Georgia's first state highway map shows State Route 38, basically as is today.

**1926**-The first map of the United States System of Highways includes U.S. 84 as an original designated Highway. U.S.41 also, the two highways then intersecting in downtown Valdosta at Ashley Street and Hill Ave.

**1963-** Interstate 75 reaches U.S. 84 and on to Florida, Ribbon cutting Ceremony at the state line with Governors: Farris Bryant, Florida; and Carl Sanders, Georgia, July 15, 1963.

1967- U.S.84 divided into East and West one ways in downtown Valdosta

1977-E. Hill Avenue/U.S.84 four-laned from Smith Park east to the city limits

1983- Definite talks begin about the four-laning of U.S.84 across South Georgia.

1985- Inner Perimeter Road segment from Forrest Street and Park Avenue completed to U.S.84.

1988- US84 to be widened, work to begin in January 1989

**1989-** East of Waycross US82 and US84 swap designations. New: U.S.82 to Brunswick, U.S.84 towards Savannah. This aligned current U.S.84 towns with their founding history, the railroad from Savannah.

1990- Valdosta to Quitman U.S.84 four-laning completed. U.S.84 Four-laning begins east towards Homerville

**1994-** Wiregrass Georgia Parkway designated by Georgia DOT as theme name for U.S.84. Ceremony held on Georgia Day, February 12, 1995. The Tom D. Shelton Highway is a designated memorial segment of same.

1996- Olympic Torch carried on U.S.84 from Toombs Street west.


2014–U.S.84 Overpass completed. Ribbon cutting October 21.

## **1960s Fallout Fears**

Searching on one subject often leads to other interesting information. Gathering dates for the U.S.84 Timeline, (see page 7), in particular, when I-75 reached 84, we checked 1960s *Progress* editions of the Chamber of Commerce. Even this publication touched on issues concerning the Soviet Union and the Cold War. For the young, during this period Soviet premier Nakita Kruschev was making continual threats in relation to the destruction of America and Western Civilization, and was moving nuclear missiles to Cuba. At junior high we had safety drills of crawling under your desk for perhaps a small bit of protection.

In the October 1963 issue of *Progress*, Volume 7, Number 6, the following list is included. "According to Rep. Wright Patman of Texas, here are some things the U.S. would have to do to equal the accomplishments of the Soviet Union."

- 1. Knock down 7 out of every 10 homes.
- 2. Cut all paychecks by 75 percent.
- 3. Abandon 95 percent of our cars and trucks.
- 4. Disconnect 9 out of every 10 telephones.
- 5. Sink 8 out of every 9 ocean-going vessels.
- 6. Scrap 40 million TV sets
- 7. Rip up 2 out of every 3 miles of railroad track.
- 8. Scrap 60 percent of our steel capacity.
- 9. Close 7 out of every 10 producing oil wells.
- 10. Ship 60 million Americans back to farms.
